Opening the Shunshinkan Dojo

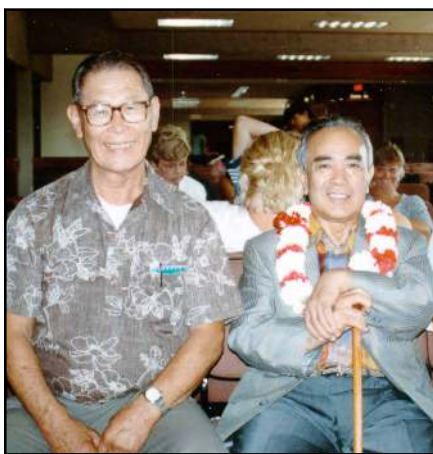
On Saturday, March 4, 2001, Shinichi Tohei Sensei offered a powerful and moving Ki Barai in blessing our new Shunshinkan Dojo on Maui. This was the culmination of many years of heartfelt effort.

Six years ago, when we first realized that our beloved old termite-eaten dojo was going to have to be replaced, we were in a state of collective shock. One evening, when I was feeling particularly attached to our old building that was soon to be torn down, Suzuki Sensei pointed out to me that a dojo is not made of wood and mats. "A dojo is created out of the spirit of the instructors and students who practice there. When we tear this old building down and build the new one" he said, "nothing will be missing. The kiai will still remain, because it goes where we go."

This statement turned out to be truer than we could have imagined. This new dojo embodies the spirit of sacrifice and perseverance of everyone involved. We now train in a dojo that is constructed literally from the good will of the members and the community at large.

And I want to say that none of this could ever have taken place without our teacher on Maui, Shinichi Suzuki Sensei. Throughout the difficult process of obtaining financing and permits for this project, over and over again, when a new and apparently insurmountable

My Time With Tohei Sensei

I first met Koichi Tohei Sensei in 1953. The Nishi Kai of Hawaii invited Tohei Sensei to come here to teach Aikido. When I saw Tohei Sensei for the first time, I was struck by the incredible calmness and clarity of his eyes. I knew that he was an extraordinary human being, and that I should begin training with him immediately.

At this time, I was a police officer with the Maui Police Department. Tohei Sensei had agreed to teach the police, free of charge, for one month. During this initial teaching period, and subsequent visits, Tohei Sensei personally taught me police self defense techniques. I have taught those same techniques to every Maui Police Recruit classes through the years.

On Tohei Sensei's second visit, in 1955, he taught me Ki Breathing and a deeper understanding of the principles of Ki and Aikido. I spent hours alone with Tohei Sensei, during which time he shared his special insights and kokyū. I am very grateful and thankful for these early teachings, which had a profound effect on me, and changed my life for the better.

The Maui Aikido Club originally organized in 1953. The four principle men were: Seichi Tabata (1st President), Kenneth Taguchi (Asst. Chief Instructor), Susumu Furukawa (Lahaina Instructor), and Shinichi Suzuki (Chief Instructor).

We constructed our first dojo on Market Street in Wailuku in 1960. This dojo was built entirely with donated materials and with labor donated by the students and friends of the Maui Aikido Club. This dojo was blessed by Morihei Ueshiba Sensei in 1961.

In the early years, there were many dojos throughout Maui County. However, today the training is centralized in the main Wailuku dojo. In 1996, at the request of the Upcountry residents of Maui, we opened a dojo in Pukalani, headed by Chris Curtis Sensei, which is still going strong.

During the 1990's, our old dojo on Market Street was gradually destroyed by termites. Beginning in 1996, we put on a massive fund raising campaign, and, thanks to many friends and supporters, were able to construct a completely new dojo, on the same grounds as the old one. The man directly responsible for the fund raising, planning, building and landscaping was Christopher Curtis Sensei, Chief Instructor of Hawaii Ki Federation, and my student of 27 years. This new dojo should last for many years to come.

I am very grateful to Tohei Sensei for all of his teachings of Ki and Aikido throughout the years. Everything I know about Ki and Aikido I owe to my teacher Tohei Sensei.

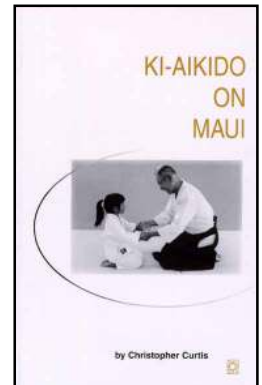

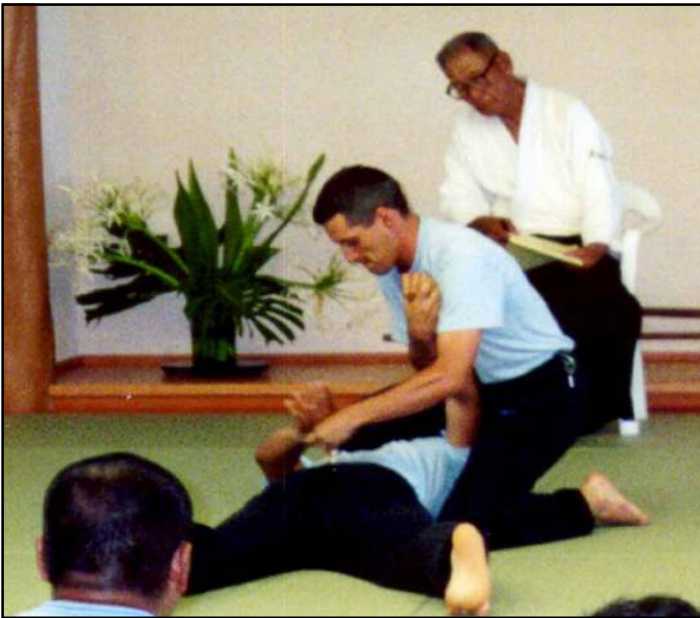

The 55th Maui Police Department Recruit Class that recently completed training with Suzuki Sensei was one of the largest MPD classes ever to train in the dojo. Suzuki Sensei has been teaching each new recruit class for 46 years.

New Introductory Course Offered

Maui Ki-Aikido will offer a beginners' introductory Aikido course taught by Christopher Curtis Sensei on four Thursdays from July 5 to 26 at the Shunshinkan Dojo. The total cost for the sessions is \$40. Tohei Sensei says, "Aikido is a discipline to make the heart of nature our own heart, to understand love for all things, and to become one with nature." During this four-week introductory course, we cover the foundation of Aikido; where it came from, what the essential aspects of it are, why we do it, what is ultimately involved from a personal point of view. It gives the student a chance to begin training with a group of students on a similar level of experience, which seems to make a big difference to many beginners. Each of the four classes deals with one of the four basic principles of Aikido: 1) Keep One Point, 2) Relax Completely, 3) Keep Weight Underside, and 4) Extend Ki. Everyone will learn the basics of sitting, standing, walking, throwing, and taking falls with mind and body unified.
